

The car was originally purchased by the state of California from well known Don Lee Cadillac & LaSalle dealership. It is rumored to have been frequently driven by then Governor Ragan. In 1986, the car was sent to British Columbia where it was on display in the Vancouver World's Fair. 

After the visit to Sam Pick's collection, members had time to rest up before heading to Billy Bob's Texas for dinner. Billy Bob's is reportedly the worlds largest honkytonk.



On Friday, January 25th club members got an early start to tour the General Motors Arlington Assembly Plant. At the Arlington plant, GM builds full size SUVs including; Chevy Tahoe and Suburban, GMC Yukon and Yukon XL and the Cadillac Escalade and Escalade-V. GM produces 1350 vehicles each day at the plant or almost one vehicle a minute! After a safety video and a briefing on the history and plant layout, we all boarded a tram to see the assembly line. The tour started in the body shop where the body sections are stamped then welded together.









After the bodies are completed they go to the paint shop (which was not on the tour) for corrosion protection and painting. Afterwards, the painted are bodies return to the assembly line for the interior and exterior components. Once the body and chassis is completed, they are "married" together by massive robots. If you would like to see a video of the body and chassis "marriage" it can be viewed here.























After the incredible tour of the GM assembly plant, we went to the Frontiers of Flight Museum. The museum is Texas' premier Air and space museum. On display are more than 40 air and space vehicles with many







historic aircraft including a Wright Brothers airworthy Flyer, the Apollo 7 Command Module and a Boeing 737-300 you can tour. Afterwards we were all treated to fantastic southern cuisine at Babe's Chicken Dinner House.

The next CLC Board Meeting will be held in Chattanooga, TN on January 29, 2025.


One Hundred Years Ago: 1924 - The Year General Motors Changed Automotive Painting by Robert Schles

1924 was a important year at General Motors for the advancement of automotive finishes. Prior to 1924 GM and other automotive manufactures painted cars the same way that horse carriages were painted, with a brush. Here's a description from an advertisement of the Studebaker Brothers Carriage Manufacturing Company: "Studebaker Finish! The most perfect, lasting surface of paint and varnish possible to put upon carriages. As the most vivid means of suggesting all the processes that culminate in a Studebaker finish, the accompanying panel was prepared. It illustrates the twenty-two successive stages of finish as they appear on every Studebaker carriage. But, there are other steps typical of Studebaker thoroughness that cannot be pictured: the chemists tests of oils and pigments; the careful preparation of the wood to take its finish properly; the repeated hand rubbing (sanding and polishing) to get smoothness; the perfect drying of the coats, an item that means fifty-two days of valuable time." 22 steps and 52 days of manufacturing time!



An article in the April 1921 issue of the *American Automotive Digest* describes the labor intensive process of repainting automobiles. Here are highlights from the 3 page article:

- Heat the old paint and varnish with a gasoline blow-torch, While still soft, remove paint with a scraper or putty knife
- To remove any remaining paint, apply a liquid paint remover in a two foot square area at a time, allowing 20-30 minutes to soften remaining paint, remove paint with a scraper or putty knife; several application may be necessary



- Clean the body with turpentine or gasoline removing all paint remover, dirt and grease
- Use an oval brush to apply the primer brushing out as smoothly as possible
- For the coloring material to give the primer enough body, add oil-ground lead in the direction of the chosen color, allow to dry
- For the next coat, beat up keg lead in one part raw linseed oil and six parts turpentine, apply with a chisel point brush, allow to dry

- ◆ Knife on the pigment coat with a 2 1/2" French scraping knife working it out as smoothly as possible, allow to dry at least 48 hours; sand with No.1 sandpaper then No. 2 sandpaper bringing out a glossy finish
- Apply the color foundation using 1 part raw linseed oil, 5
 parts turpentine and 1 case of Japan ground color; allow to
 dry to lose it's gloss but not dead in appearance
- For the first coat, flow on a color varnish as soon as possible, rub with a wet wool sponge dipped in pumicestone flour allow; to dry 48 hours
- For the second coat, halve the amount of color varnish, rub with a wet wool sponge dipped in pumice-stone flour allow to dry at least 2 days
- Apply any pinstriping, allow to dry, then apply a coat of rubbing varnish, allow to dry 3 days, rub with a wet wool sponge dipped in pumice-stone flour; allow to dry
- The final finish applied is an elastic body finishing varnish

Just reading all the steps is exhausting. Furthermore, the affects of the hazardous chemicals involved on the health of the painters could not have been good. Ford, at the time, was using high-temperature baked black enamel paint on all Model T's. The Model T's were black because black dried the quickest of all the colors, taking about a week.

In 1921, the DuPont Chemical Company discovered nitrocellulose lacquer. On a hot Friday afternoon in July 1921, as the story goes, a worker at the DuPont film plant left a drum of gun cotton (cotton fibers treated with a nitrate solution) out on a loading dock during the very warm weekend. Monday morning, concerned workers brought the drum inside and opened it up. To their amazement, what they found wasn't gun cotton, but a clear, viscous liquid. This liquid became the foundation of nitrocellulose lacquer. The lacquer finish, sold under the name Duco Automotive Paint, would be used for the next 50 years. Following this discovery, the DuPont Chemical Company worked with GM engineers on developing both the lacquer paint and primer for automotive use with this new material. The lacquer paint was a huge improvement over the varnish and enamels of the time. Most low-end varnish finishes came in few colors, while Duco was made available in a variety of colors.

By this time paint spray guns had been around for several years. But it wasn't until 1924, after a few years of testing, General Motors introduced the use of spraying on the Duco finish on Oakland Automobiles. I am sure it wasn't a coincidence GM was one of the first companies to use Duco Paint on it's assembly line. Pierre S. du Pont who was then president of GM was also on the board of directors of duPont Chemical Company. "Duco has become so popular," reported one GM executive, "that customers are now demanding it." Alfred P. Sloan who took over as president of General Motors recognized that Duco was such a sensation he recommended that GM apply it to all models. By mid-1925 GM used the Duco lacquer finish on their entire automotive line-up. Cadillacs could still be ordered with any available type of finish the customer preferred. By the end of 1925, more than 14 automotive manufactures were using the Duco finish. The quick-drying, spray-on Duco reduced the steps, drying time, labor costs, and storage space. The Duco automotive paint enabled manufactures to end the old process of applying the finish using scrapping knifes and brushes.

Below are pictures from the January 1926 issue of *General Motors World* magazine of a GM Body Plant in Australia applying the Duco paint finish. GM was the only auto manufacture using Duco paint in Australia at



that time. Duco paint dried faster than varnish and baked enamel, was cheap to apply, and could be made in any color. GM dealers also ordered stocks of Duco paint for the purpose of speeding up used car sales by refinishing the used cars with the Duco finish. The new Duco paint not only cut costs but the new finish added great value to GM's automotive lineup for many years to come.


LOOK TO THE REAR: Owners of 1956 Cadillacs are warned to watch out when backing their cars. In response to a poll taken last year, designers completely revamped the gear ratios for this year's models. One thing that people complained of was the slow reverse of their Caddies, so this year's gear ratio has been upped to a whopping 4.3:1. Results? A little less power, but plenty of speed.

LEADING THE FIELD: Two innovations first introduced in '56 Cadillacs are soon to be released to other auto manufactures. These are electrically-operated radio antennas and the "remote control" exterior rear-view mirrors. The new electrical antenna replaced the vacuum-operated antenna standard until this year. The exterior rear-view mirror combines the expansive view of the old mirror with an inside "spot light" control, enabling the driver to adjust the mirror from within the car.

ALL THAT GLITTERS: The gold grille and gold spoke wheels available on all '56 Cadillacs may be the beginnings of another Cadillac "first". What looks like a solid gold grille is anodized aluminum. This is accomplished through an electro-chemical process of building up an aluminum oxide layer on stamped or cast aluminum, then dipping the metal into a color dye, and chemically sealing the color. The process locks in the color permanently. According to aluminum manufactures, this is just the beginning of the use of color metals in automobiles. GM's 1956 dream cars features a brushed aluminum top which reflects the heat better than most light colors. Chrome moldings may be replaced with colored anodized aluminum for new styling concepts. Wheel caps and bumpers are also well within the realm of possibility for the new models. Watch for gleaming aluminum in many new locations on next year's cars.


