The Early Days Of The Valley Forge Region

Continuing the story of The Birth Of A Region - 50 Years Ago This Year The Region Was Formed.

Over the years, the members of the Valley Forge Region (VFR) have actively participated in numerous Cadillac & LaSalle Club Grand Nationals. In 1993 the Valley Forge Region hosted its first Grand National in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The event took place across the road from the Dutch Wonderland amusement park, an iconic destination in the heart of Pennsylvania Dutch Country. That year's Grand National was particularly memorable for setting a record—the largest gathering of LaSalles ever assembled, with more than 30 of these automobiles on the show field.

In 2008, the Valley Forge Region once again took the lead in organizing a Grand National, this time in Cherry Hill, New Jersey. This event carried special significance, as it marked the 50th anniversary of the Cadillac & LaSalle Club. The show field filled to capacity with 405 vehicles.

Continuing its tradition of excellence, the Valley Forge Region partnered with the Potomac Region in 2017 to co-host another Grand National, this time in McLean, Virginia. The event, held at the Hilton McLean Tysons Corner, drew over 1,100 attendees. The week-long celebration featured a display of 325 cars, including rare and historically significant models, making it a very memorable gatherings in recent club history.

How a 1959 Cadillac Changed My Life By Ed McGettigan



Shortly after being discharged from the US Navy in 1962, I purchased a 1959 Cadillac Series 62 convertible in Gotham Gold. The Caddy became my daily driver and without it I may not have met my wife. She would often see the convertible with the big fins driving around town and loved the car but she didn't know who owned it. One day we spied each other at a gas station as her brother was getting gas and she was the passenger in his Fiat convertible. She saw me with the Caddy and I saw how beautiful



she was which was the start of our 60 years together. We were married in 1967 and drove the Caddy to our honeymoon in the Poconos.

Sometime in 1972 the 390 cu in engine became problematic. Now with a growing family, I decided to say goodbye to the Cadillac. Fast forward to 2002 when I saw a 1959 Cadillac Series 6267 convertible for sale on eBay. It was identical to the one I bought 40 years earlier, except for the black convertible top, and I could not resist wanting it again. My son and I flew from Philadelphia, PA to Tampa Bay, FL to inspect the car. It was a beauty and of course, I bought it. I then learned that the car was owned by the professional wrestler Randy Poffo, aka Randy 'Macho Man' Savage.



The Caddy is a matching numbers car with mostly original paint. It has won numerous car show awards including two first place awards and one second place award at three Cadillac Grand Nationals.







The Caddy is a dream to drive with that smooth Cadillac ride and powerful 390 CID engine at my command. My wife and I enjoy the wonderful memories of our youth each time that we go for a cruise in that special Caddy.

Bring your classic or modern car and join us for a scenic covered bridge run through southern Chester County, PA. During the drive, we'll visit four picturesque covered bridges in the stunning Brandywine Valley. This run is a modified version the Brandywine AACA region did last year.

After the drive, we invite you to join us for lunch (on your own) at Two Stones Pub https://twostonespub.com/kennett-square/ in Kennett Square, PA. While you're in the area, take some time to explore nearby attractions such as Longwood Gardens, The Brandywine Museum of Art, The Brandywine Battlefield or the many charming antique shops in the region. It's the perfect way to enjoy the beauty and history of this unique area!

Starting Point: Northbrook Marketplace

Address: 1805 Unionville Wawaset Rd, West Chester, PA 19382

Northbrook Marketplace is located at the corner of Rt. 842 and Northbrook Road in West Chester, PA.

Arrival Time: Please plan to arrive at 9:30 AM. Arriving early allows time to use the restrooms (note: there will be two opportunities to stop for restroom facilities during the drive), grab a cup of coffee, and chat with fellow club members before we begin the drive. We aim to depart promptly at 10:00 AM after a group photo.

The Drive: Our route covers 55 scenic miles, taking us by four beautiful covered bridges, with an optional lunch stop at the end. The drive is expected to take just under two hours, but it may extend longer depending on conditions. **Important Considerations:** The route includes narrow roads with limited shoulders, so please take this into account when deciding whether to join and which car to drive.


Our first bridge will be the **Gibson-Harmony Hill Bridge** outside of Marshallton, PA. It was built in 1872 by Edward Hall and Thomas Schull. It's a 78-foot-long Burr truss bridge. This is the only covered bridge remaining over the Brandywine Creek crossing, over the east branch of the Creek.



Our second bridge will be the **Speakman Bridge** #1; there is a Speakman #2 bridge, but it's on private property. Our bridge resides outside of Coatesville, originally constructed in 1881. The bridge at one time served the Johnathan Speakman gristmill, thus the name. It is 75 feet long and has a Burr arch truss design.

Our next bridge will be the **Linton Stevens Bridge** 1051 Kings Row Rd, Oxford, PA. The
County built an iron bridge here in 1875. This
was so damaged by the June 26, 1884 flood
that J. Denithorne & Son were paid \$1,294.00
for repairing it. Only two years later a wooden
covered bridge replaced the iron bridge. The
bridge was named for Linton Stephens, a local
postmaster. Chester County bridge
maintenance records show an unexplained
change of the spelling to Stevens in 1914.

Driving south on Kings Row Road we head to **Glen Hope Covered Bridge**, the last and most southern bridge on the tour. The bridge is located only ½ mile from the Mason-Dixon Line; the border between Maryland and Pennsylvania. It is a 65-foot-long Burr truss bridge, constructed in 1889 and spans the Little Elk Creek. It has vertical planking and eave -level window openings.







Our ride formally ends here. If you would like to join us, we head to the village of Kennett Square, PA where we gather for an optional lunch on your own at the **Two Stones Pub**, 843 East Baltimore Pike Kennett Square, PA 19438. Located in the Shoppes at Longwood Village where there is plenty of parking for your classic or modern car.

While you're in the area, be sure to check out nearby attractions like Longwood Gardens https://www.brandywine.org/, The Brandywine Revolutionary War Battlefield https://www.brandywinebattlefield.org/, or the quaint antique shops scattered throughout the region. It's a great way to experience the beauty and history of this one-of-a-kind region!



& Board Meeting 2025



On Thursday morning, we took a bus to the **Coker Museum** which was started by Corky Coker during his time with the Coker Tire company. Spanning over 13,000 square feet, the museum showcases over 100 vintage cars, motorcycles, trucks, buses, creating a truly memorable experience. Upon arrival, we were welcomed by Corky Coker himself, who



shared the history of the antique automotive tire business, founded by his father Harold Coker in 1958, along with a few entertaining anecdotes about several cars in the collection.


















After the Coker museum, lunch was served at The Feed Co. Table. Following lunch, we headed to **Ruby Falls**, one of Tennessee's most breathtaking natural attractions. Located deep within Lookout Mountain, Ruby Falls is an underground cave system featuring a scenic mile-long round-trip path that winds through stunning rock formations. The highlight of the tour is the awe-inspiring 40-foot waterfall, which cascades dramatically from the cavern ceiling, illuminated by a spectacular light display.

On Friday, we had the unique opportunity to visit the **Kayo Erwin Private Car Collection**, a remarkable and exclusive gathering of classic and rare automobiles. This private collection, owned by renowned car enthusiast Kayo Erwin, showcases an















After exploring the remarkable Kayo Erwin Private Car Collection, we enjoyed a delightful lunch at the **Mayor's Mansion Inn**, a historic bed and breakfast nestled in the heart of Chattanooga. Despite its name, this charming establishment is not the current residence of Chattanooga's mayor but was once the home of a former city mayor.

Following lunch, we boarded the bus and made our way to the **International Towing & Recovery Museum**, a hidden gem in Chattanooga dedicated to preserving the history of the towing and recovery industry. Upon arrival, we were welcomed by the museum staff, who provided an overview of the exhibits and the significance of Chattanooga in the towing industry—being the birthplace of the first-ever tow truck, invented in 1916 by local mechanic Ernest Holmes Sr.

The museum showcases an astonishing array of vintage tow trucks, from early hand-crank models to massive modern recovery vehicles. One of the highlights of the collection was a **1913 Cadillac tow truck**, a rare and fascinating piece of automotive history that exemplifies the ingenuity and craftsmanship of the early towing industry. Seeing a Cadillac repurposed for heavy-duty recovery work was a unique sight, blending luxury with practicality.












- New CLC logo approved with lighting bolt added to represent electric vehicles made by Cadillac

Overall, my first experience on the National Board was both enlightening and rewarding. It provided valuable insight into the dedicated work being done behind the scenes by the Executive Officers to sustain and grow the club. I

Learning from a Cadillac Buying Addict By Michael Stinson



- **Decide** *ahead* **of time what you want**; an occasional driver? A weekend cruiser? A concours show car? The answer to this question, more than budget, year, make, model or even body style will guide your search, and in fact, answers the other questions. Dad told me once, "With a substantial purchase, decide first what you want, then worry about price.
- **Be patient;** the right car will manifest itself, often when you're *not* looking. With only one or two exceptions, I found cars that I really like and enjoy when I wasn't going to auctions or trolling the internet (although I still do!).
- **Don't "fall in love;** remain brutally objective, if not skeptical, until you have enough data to make an informed decision.
- Never buy a collector car sight-unseen; if you can't inspect the car yourself, get a prepurchase inspection that will document the condition (and estimated value) of the car. To plug my "side gig", one of the best inspection / appraisal companies I have found in the country is Auto Appraisal Group (www.autoappraisal.com). I was so impressed with their comprehensive inspection / valuation process, not only am I a client, I am also one of their independent inspection agents located throughout the country.
- **Buy 'em done**, either restored, or a well-preserved & cared-for original, whenever possible. This does not apply if your journey includes restoring or modifying a project car.
- The purchase price is only a "down payment; you must budget for what work, repairs and maintenance will be needed. And they *all* need *something*, regardless of condition or mileage.
- Enjoy it! These cars are a ton of work; make time to drive and enjoy the fruits of your labor and your investment.
- Drive it! Even if you want to keep the odometer low, these cars need to be driven occasionally. I occasionally ask myself, for whom am I keeping the miles low the next owner?

Engine Oil Mythology

As spring arrives, many car members are eager to prepare their vehicles for the upcoming driving season. For classic car owners, this preparation involves several critical maintenance tasks to ensure their prized possessions run smoothly and reliably. Among these tasks, changing the oil is particularly important.

Fresh oil is essential for maintaining the engine's health, especially in classic cars, where older engines can be more susceptible to wear and tear. Over time, oil can break down and become contaminated with dirt and debris, reducing its ability to lubricate engine components effectively. Regular oil changes help prevent engine damage, improve performance, and extend the lifespan of the vehicle.

In addition to changing the oil, classic car owners should also inspect other key systems, such as the brakes, tires, and cooling system. Addressing these maintenance tasks not only enhances the driving experience but also preserves the vehicle's value and ensures it remains in top condition for years to come.

Here is an article originally written by Bob Olree, GMPT (General Motors Power Train) Fuels and Lubes, from Journey with Olds about engine oil mythology sent in to us by Jack Holz. The article is still as relevant today as was when it was published on 2/13/07.

Myths are ill-founded beliefs held uncritically by interested groups. Over the years there has been an overabundance of engine oil myths. One was that the only good oils were made from "Pure Pennsylvania Crude Oil". This one got started before the Second World War when engine oil was crude oil with minimal refining and crude oil from Pennsylvania made better engine oil than Texas or California crude. With modern refining almost any crude oil can be made into good engine oil.

The next myth was that "modern" detergent engine oils were bad for older engines. This one got started after the Second World War when the government no longer needed all the detergent oil



for the war effort, and it hit the market as Heavy-Duty oil. These new detergent oils gave the pre-war cars, which had been driven way past their normal life and were full of sludge and deposits, a massive enema. In some cases bad things happened such as increased oil consumption-the piston rings were completely worn out and the massive piston deposits were the only thing standing between merely high and horrendous oil consumption. If detergent oils had been available to the public during the war, this myth would never had started.

Amazingly there are still a few people today, 60 years later, who believe they need to use non-detergent oil in their older cars. Apparently it takes about 75 years for an oil myth to die.

Then there is the myth that new engines will not break-in on synthetic oils. Apparently there was an aircraft engine manufacturer who once put out a bulletin to this effect. Clearly the thousands and thousands of cars filled with Mobil 1 as factory fill, which have broke-in quite well, should have put this one to rest. However this one is only 40 years old, so it has another 35 years to live.



All these myths have a common theme; newer oils are bad. And this brings us to the latest myth-new "Starburst"/API SM engine oils are bad for older cars because the amount of anti-wear additive in them has been reduced. This one has gotten big play in the antique and collector car press lately. The anti-wear additive being discussed is zinc dithiophosphate(ZDP).

Before debunking this myth we need to look at the history of ZDP usage in engine oils. ZDP has been used for over 60 years as an additive in engine oils to provide wear protection and oxidation stability. Unfortunately ZDP contains phosphorus, and phosphorus is a poison for automotive catalysts. For this reason ZDP levels have been reduced by about 35% over the last 10 to 15 years down to a maximum of 0.085 for 'Starburst"/API SM oils.

ZDP was first added to engine oil to control copper/lead bearing corrosion. Starting in 1942, a Chevrolet Stovebolt engine with aftermarket copper/lead

insert bearing connecting rods was the standard oil test. The insert bearings were weighed before and after test for weight loss due to corrosion. The phosphorus levels of oils that passed the test were in the 0.01% range.

In the mid 1950's Oldsmobile got in a horsepower war with its Rocket engine against the Chrysler Hemi. Both the companies went to high-lift camshafts and both got into camshaft scuffing and wear problems very fast. There were three solutions. Better camshaft and lifter metallurgy, phosphating the camshaft, or increasing the phosphorus level



from ZDP up to the 0,08% range. Another outcome was a battery of industry wide "Sequence" oil tests.

Two of these tests were valve-train scuffing/wear tests. Knowing that this higher level of ZDP was good for flat-tappet valve-train scuffing and wear, some oil companies dumped even more ZDP in thinking that they were offering the customer even more protection. However it was soon learned that while going above something like 0.14% phosphorus might decrease break-in scuffing, it increased longer term wear. At about 0.20% phosphorus the ZDP started attacking the grain boundaries in the iron, resulting in camshaft spalling.

Later in the 1970's, the ZDP level was pushed up to the 0.10% phosphorus range as it was a cheap and effective antioxidant, and increased antioxidency was needed to protect the oil in Cadillacs pulling Airstream trailers from thickening to the point of not pumping. Recently, the need for this higher level of ZDP for protecting the oil from thickening has been greatly reduced with the introduction of more modern ash-less antioxidants that contain no phosphorus.

Enough history, now getting back to the myth that "Starburst"/API SM oils are no good for older cars. The argument put forth by the myth believers is that while these oils work well in modern gasoline engines equipped with roller camshafts, they will cause catastrophic wear in older engines with flat-tappet camshafts.




The "Starburst"/API SM oil standards were developed by a group of OEM, an oil additive company, and oil company experts. When developing any new engine oil standard the issue of "backward compatibility" always comes up, and indeed the group of experts spent a lot of time researching this issue. Various oil and additive companies ran "no harm" tests on older cars with the new oils. No problems were uncovered.

The new specifications contain two valve train tests. One is the Sequence IVA Test which tests for camshaft wear and scuffing using a 2.4L foreign single overhead camshaft engine with slider finger followers. The wear limits were tightened from the previous oil specifications which contained a phosphorus limit of 0.10%. The second is the Sequence IIIG Test which evaluates cam and lifter wear. A current production GM Powertrain 3.8L engine with the valve train replaced with a flat tappet system similar to those used in the 1980's is used. The only reason that this test engine uses this older valve train design is to ensure that older engines are protected. All "Starburst"/API SM oil formulations must pass these tests.

In addition to the protection offered by these valve train tests and the new testing which was conducted on the formulations containing lower levels of ZDP, a review of the knowledge gained over the years in developing previous categories also indicates that no problem should be expected. The new oils contain about the same percentage of ZDP as the oils that solved the scuffing problem back in the 50's. They do contain less ZDP than the oils that solved the thickening problem in the 60's, but that is because they now contain high levels of ash-less anti-oxidants that were not available in the 1960's.

The ZDP level is only one factor in determining the life of an older camshaft or a new aftermarket cam. Most of the anecdotal reports of cam failures attributed to the new oils appear to be with aftermarket camshafts. Breaking in extremely aggressive camshafts has always been a problem.

Despite the pains taken in developing special flat tappet camshaft wear tests that these new oils must pass and the fact that the ZDP level of these new oils is comparable to the level found necessary to protect flat tappet cams in the past, there will still be those who want to believe the myth "new oils will wear out old engines". Like other myths before it,
